Planting Instructions: 2-3 lbs/1000 sq. ft.

- 1. Apply seed no more than 1/4 inch deep in a well prepared seed bed.**
- 2. Roll something over the seed to ensure good soil contact.**
- 3. Water as needed to keep the ground moist until the seed sprouts (usually 10-14 days).**
- 4. Make sure to water 2-3 time a week for the first month.**

You may fertilize AFTER the second mowing if needed

In early Fall give the Black Jack a good dose of fertilizer. In the early Spring, when your Black Jack is dormant, give it a close mowing to help speed up Spring green up .





BERMUDAGRASS

LIGHT REQUIREMENTS: Full Sun (6 to 8 hours per day)

WATER REQUIREMENTS: Seed beds should be kept moist until germination. For two weeks after planting we recommend that you try to water the seed beds 2-3 times a day, for about 10-15 minutes at a time, just to keep the top layer of soil moist. After germination you can cut watering back to once a day, if possible. Keeping the seed bed moist is very important to starting your lawn, especially in the heat of summer.

MOWING HEIGHT: Bermudagrass can be kept short. Maintain Bermudagrass at 1 to 2 inches tall. The more you mow, the thicker and fuller your Bermudagrass will become. Mow grass taller for more drought tolerance.

PLANTING SPECIFICATIONS: Sow Bermuda seed at a planting depth of 1/4 inch, using two pounds of seed per 1000 square feet. **Bermuda can germinate quickly, usually in ten to fourteen days.** Under the proper conditions, it can become fully established in 60 to 90 days. Seed may not germinate if the soil temperature is too cool or too hot.

FERTILIZER: Bermuda thrives on fertilizer. After your lawn is established you should apply fertilizer to Bermuda two to three times during the growing season. We recommend that you do not apply fertilizer onto your lawn until after the second mowing. If you get fertilizer down too early, it could hurt the growing process of the seed. In April, it will start to come out of its dormant state. When it is about 50% green, apply a slow-release, high nitrogen, fertilizer to your lawn. Make a second application about six to eight weeks later or as directed on the bag. A third application in another six weeks may be desired. Apply a "winterizer" to Bermuda around October to prevent winter injury.

A word of caution: Do not combine Bermuda seed and Bermuda sod. Most Bermuda sod varieties are hybrids and do not mix well with the grass from common Bermuda seed, because they have different appearances and textures.

WEED CONTROL FOR BERMUDAGRASS

For years, manufacturers of broadleaf weed control products have combined several herbicides in one product which is why you hear the term three-way. These have commonly included 2,4D, mecoprop, and dicamba, which are common names of the herbicide. These products are combined because together they control more weeds than any one of them would alone. For example, MCPP provides better control of clover and chickweed than does 2,4-D, and dicamba provides better control of ground ivy.

Many products are available in liquid and granular formulations with these three ingredients for Bermuda grass lawns. One reason for the popularity of these products is that most of these can be applied to all of the commonly grown turf grasses in the south including Bermudagrass lawns. Always follow the directions on the label

One of the best ways to ensure a weed free Bermudagrass lawn is to have a happy, healthy lawn. The more you mow, the more you water and keep it well fertilized will help prevent the growth of weeds.
